
### Welcome to Week 7 of Zest at Home!

## Soundscapes

**Activity:** Create a soundscape using objects around you.

**Time:** 30 mins (ish)

**You will need:** Objects, paper and something to draw with.

### Suggested Steps:

- 1) Listen** - Close your eyes and pay close attention to all the different noises around you. Loud and quiet, close and distant.
- 2) Draw** all of the sounds you can hear as a map, using shapes, symbols, colours and words. Fill the page.
- 3) Create** sounds by interacting with objects around you. Be inventive with what you choose. Try tapping them, shaking them or brushing them.
- 4) Look** at your sound drawing and imagine it as a musical score. Try playing this score with the objects as your instruments.
- 5) Record** it if you can on a phone or take a photo of your sound map and send it to us!
